# Athletic renovations continue with newly resurfaced gym floor

Students and staff are well into the beginning of the school year and are adjusting to the school life filled with getting up early, going to class and stressing over grades.

New teachers and students have been introduced into the school year as have many new students, though the number of how many are unknown. But people aren't the only new things being welcomed into the school. A new gymnasium floor and new tennis courts are currently being implemented.

Students athletes are confused as to why the gymnasium flooring wasn't refinished before the school year started, leaving the volleyball team to practice and play in the axillary gym. As with most construction or renovation projects, the timing of it all may have been out of the school's hands.

"They have to coordinate with the company and when they have the funds, so it was just a figure of opportunity," new Athletic Director Levi Carmichael said.

Due to this renovation, all indoor fall athletic events have been moved to the auxiliary gym. This is most inconvenient for the volleyball team.

"Inconvenient really because there is no air conditioning and it looks worse in photos," senior volleyball player Tayllor McCaffery said.

It even goes as far as volleyball players feeling less important; as some have mentioned the unfairness between them and basketball players. Players mentioned the athletic department hopes to finish the floor before basketball season starts but not caring about volleyball season. One even pointed out the tennis court being redone over summer.

The process of refinishing the gymnasium flooring is more complicated than people think.

"They basically sand off all the wax that builds up over years on the floor and they sand down the wood. So the wood actually becomes a lighter, more natural color. Once they do that, then we will be approving a new design for the floor. Then they'll bring in someone to paint the designs and paint the floor. Once the floor is painted they will then do a new sealer on top of the floor to basically make it a finished product," Carmichael said.

The athletic department is unsure of the exact date the renovations will be completed, but it will completed by basketball season. The gym floor renovation is just one of several improvement projects that have taken place. Last spring the complex housing the football locker rooms and concession stand was repainted and the tennis courts are being resurfaced at this time, as well. The next project in the works will be the auxiliary gym.



3. Why did you choose to come to Clarksville High School?



I love teaching here at Clarksville. I grew up in a small village in Michigan (Addison) and my school was about this same size. I know and love this everybody knows everybody atmosphere.


3. Why did you choose to come to Clarksville High School?

#### New schedule leads to confusion
